What YOU will learn:

Anthropology studies the full range of the human experience, from human origins and prehistoric cultures, to traditional and modern societies. While anthropology documents human behavior and cultural patterns around the world, it is also concerned with preserving cultural diversity and improving the lives of peoples who live in today's changing world.

When you major in anthropology, your core classes will introduce you to prehistory, cultural and physical anthropology. Advanced courses offered in archaeology, biological anthropology, and cultural anthropology include North American Archaeology, Old World Prehistory, Medical Anthropology, Human Growth and Development, Ecological Anthropology and Social Structure.

Career opportunities YOU will have:

As an anthropology major you will have career opportunities in many fields. You might find work with an international business or with an agency involved with international development. Anthropology training can lead to careers in inter-cultural education, health care, and human services. You may do cultural preservation and interpretation in parks and public lands.
